WHY YOU PROCRASTINATE EVEN WHEN YOU KNOW IT'S BAD.

Time runs out on a task you've been putting on the back burner and you begin to feel the pressure that could easily have been avoided. Situations like these typically bring on a slew of difficult emotions like blame, anger, frustration and anxiety.

As you scramble to complete the task, you might find yourself asking, "Why do I do this?" Well, you're not alone. This is the cycle of procrastination and I promise you, we have all been there. But why do we keep procrastinating even when we know it's bad for us?

To be clear, putting something off isn't always procrastinating. Responsible time management requires deciding which tasks are important and which ones can wait. Procrastination is when we avoid a task we said we would do, for no good reason, despite expecting our behavior to bring negative consequences. Obviously, it's irrational to do something you expect to harm you. But ironically, procrastination is the result of our bodies trying to protect us, specifically by avoiding a task we see as threatening. When you realize you need to write that report, your brain responds like it would to any incoming threat. It's in the midst of this fight, flight or freeze response that you decide to handle the threat by avoiding it in favor of some less stressful task. This response might seem extreme- after all, it's just a deadline and not a bear attack. But we are most likely to procrastinate tasks that evoke negative feelings, such as dread, incompetency, and insecurity. However, it's a common misconception that all procrastinators are lazy. In fact, many people procrastinate because they care too much, as they have a high fear of failing, putting things off because they are afraid their work won't live up to their high standards. Whatever the reasons for procrastination, the results are often the same.



So, how can we break the cycle of procrastination? You may think procrastinators need to cultivate discipline and practice strict time management. But in reality, it's the exact opposite. Being too hard on yourself can layer additional bad emotions onto the task, making the threat even more intense. To short-circuit this stress response, we need to address and reduce these negative emotions. Some simple strategies include breaking a task into smaller elements or journaling about why it's stressing you out and addressing those underlying concerns. Try removing nearby distractions that make it easy to impulsively procrastinate. More than anything, it helps to cultivate an attitude of self-compassion, forgiving yourself, and making a plan to do better next time. Because a culture that perpetuates a cycle of stress and procrastination hurts all of us in the long term. As Charles Dickens rightly said "Procrastination is the thief of time". All you have to decide is what to do with the time given to you. If the habit of procrastination is broken, then you will find new opportunities to add colors to your sky!

THE GOOD BURDEN

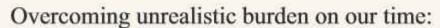
Burden: Tailor it perfectly, wear it beautifully, never show how heavy it was.

A number of locations, including nature, sculptures, monuments, and even the human body—which is typically represented by the symbol phi and has a value of 1.6180339887—have significant applications for the concept of the "Golden Ratio."

Uniqueness:

The golden ratio is the only number whose square can be produced simply by adding 1 and whose reciprocal by subtracting 1. It is believed to be one of the strongest and oldest connections between math and creative arts.

The Golden Ratio of the Taj Mahal is one of the greatest role models of all architectures and till now its mathematical proportions leaves engineers awestruck.

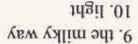

The lightest-known black hole is only 3.8 times the Sun's mass. It's paired up with a star.

SPIN Black hole

All black holes spin. The fastest-known – named GRS 1915+105 – clocks in at over 1,000 rotations per second.

Q & A on Pongal!

Q1: What's Pongal Festival?

A1: Pongal is a harvest festival, primarily celebrated in TamilNadu.

It is a thanksgiving celebration, to thank rain god Indra, the sun, Mother Nature and the various farm animals that help to contribute to a bountiful harvest.

Q2: What's this festival name, in other parts of India?

A2: A similar festival called Lohri / Makar Sankranti / Uttarayan Celebrated in different parts of India, as it marks the transition to springtime after the winter and the start of the sun's six-month-long journey northwards.

Q3: What does Pongal Mean?

A3: This festival is named after a Tamil word Pongal, which means, "to boil, overflow", represents the Joyous & Prosperity overflow and traditional dish pongal, which is made with (newly harvested) rice that's boiled with milk and a kind of sugar (Jaggery), in a pot.

Q4: For how many days will the festival be celebrated? What are they called?

A4: Pongal festival will be celebrated for four days in Tamilnadu as Bhogi Pongal, Thai Pongal, Mattu Pongal & KanumPongal.

Q5: Which day Bhogi festival falls on?

A5: It's the first day of the festival, falls on the last day of the Tamil month Margazhi.

On this day, people discard old belongings and celebrate new possessions.

People worship & thank God Indra - god of rain.

Q6: How is Pongal celebrated?

A6: It's also known as Surya Pongal / Thai Pongal, it's the second day of the

festival and main festive day.

It falls on the first day of the Tamil month Thai, hence this day is called Thai Pongal.

On this day, people worship and thank God Sun, by offering prayers, pongal and other dishes, over an open space, directly under sun, hence this day is called as Surya Pongal.

Q7: How do we thank cows?

We celebrate Mattu Pongal on the 3rd day of the festival, which falls on the 2rd day of the Tamil Month Thai.

People offer prayers and thank the cows and other cattle, for their contribution towards the harvest.

The cows / cattle are bathed, their horns are painted, decorated with flowers, and taken for a procession.

Q8: what's Kaanum Pongal?

A8: It's the 4th day of the festival & marks the end of Pongal Festivities of this year. The word kaanum in the context means "to visit" and families hold reunions on this day. People visit elders to pay respects and seek blessings, with elders giving gifts to the visiting children.

Cyclone El Nino led to cause flood due to heavy rainfall generated by the annual Northeast monsoon in November December 2015. It killed more than 500 people and over 18 lakh people were displaced. Cyclone Vardah was the fourth cyclonic storm in the 2016 Northern-Indian Ocean cyclone season. Cyclone Mandous was third most

powerful tropical cyclone of the Northern India Ocean cyclone season in 2022. But friends, have you notice that Tamil Nadu faces water scarcity throughout the year and when it is monsoon, it is suffering from flood. The reason behind this is that 95 percentage of Tamil Nadu's land is covered with cement or concrete. There is no way for water to seep in. As a responsible citizen of the country and much of the globe, we must take several serious steps towards bettering the situation before it's too late.
